Snowflakes

The saying “unique snowflake” makes me wonder, are all snowflakes really unique? Molecularly, yes, they are unique, but are they all shaped differently? Scientists have categorized snowflakes into 35 shapes, but their individuality still exists as the ice crystals form slight variations of these shapes.

The shape of a snowflake is very dependent on temperature and humidity — simpler shapes are more common at lower humidity, and more complex shapes are more common at higher humidity. It all starts in a cloud. Water vapors from the air stick to tiny grains of dust or pollen then freeze as the temperature cools. A tiny hexagonal crystal is formed. As the frozen grain gains weight, it begins to travel to the ground with the help of gravity. As it falls, more vapor condenses on the crystal and the snowflake continues to take shape.

As you watch the snow fall this winter, grab a magnifying glass and take a closer look. What do you notice about their shape? What are the similarities? What are the differences? Can you categorize them?

Snowflakes; they are all beautiful, and unique...ish.

Tips for Birdseed Storage

Stocking up on birdseed for the winter is common practice, especially when you can buy it directly from Audubon through the Birdseed Sale. Follow the techniques listed below in order to ensure your seed remains fresh. Properly stored seed should last 9 months to a year.

1. Use airtight storage containers.
2. Store seed in a cool, dry place preferably indoors.
3. Use up old seed before adding new seed to your storage container.
4. Check your seed regularly to make sure it is fresh and hasn't spoiled or gotten bugs in it. Pantry moths can make their way into seed that hasn't been stored in airtight containers. Also, check the seed in your feeders regularly to make sure it hasn't spoiled otherwise the birds will not eat it or might get sick from it.

Visit Audubon to buy Conewango Blend when the birds are ready for more.

Amazing Evergreens

During the cold, snowy months of winter, plants and animals do all sorts of things to survive. While animals can move to escape the cold, plants are rooted in place. Unlike animals, plants must always be prepared to survive whatever weather comes their way.

Some plants survive the winter by dropping their leaves in the fall. Evergreen trees, like spruce, pine, fir, and hemlock trees, hold onto their green needles all winter long. Unlike other leaves that can be damaged by ice and snow, needles have a thick, waxy coating that protects them from the ice and snow. By keeping their needles all winter long these trees don't have to expend energy growing new leaves in the spring.

Even though needles are designed to remain on the tree through winter, snow can still be a big problem for evergreens. Large amounts of snow can cause branches to bend and snap. Luckily evergreens have extremely tough and flexible branches. When their upper branches get filled with snow, they bend and dump snow onto the larger branches down below.

Evergreens aren't the only living things that benefit from durable branches during the winter. These amazing trees serve as shelter for many animals, including birds and deer. While some trees have no way of protecting animals from snow and wind after they drop their leaves, the needles on evergreen trees are perfect for keeping all types of animals warm and dry.
