

# This Month in ACNC History

Here's is what was happening at this time in Audubon's past.

#### 1964

"It takes a lot to DAMPEN the spirits of our enthusiastic Audubon members. In spite of the rain, about 50 people attended the meeting... at the beautiful country home of Mr. and Mrs. Clare Limberg."

#### 1974

"The photography-blind observation platform (now Spatterdock Photo Blind)... will soon become a reality due to the generosity of Lucille Parsons of Chautauqua."

#### 1984

"If guests should inquire about the lack of water in the Big Pond, please inform them that the primary reason is the need to control the carp population."

#### 1994

"...Audubon is about people. People who give so much of their time, energy and other resources to make so many wonderful and important things happen for other people and the natural world."

#### 2004

"The entrance wildflower garden is actually beginning to resemble its name." (On replanting the original landscaping with native plants.)

#### 2014

"Starting June 21, we will have many "Chestnut pulling" days on Big Pond and Spatterdock Pond. Our goal is that no flowers be allowed to set seed this year." (On the second year of pulling invasive Water Chestnut from the ponds.)



#### **Volunteer Milestones**

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# Nature Notes — Crab Spiders

Do all spiders make webs as traps to catch their prey? All spiders can produce silk but not all spin a web. Spiders have a variety of hunting methods, including one that hides in summer flowers waiting to ambush their prey.

Look at a flower, such as a daisy, Queen Anne's Lace, or goldenrod and you might spot a crab spider. These spiders are active and visible throughout summer and early fall.

There are over 2,000 species of crab spiders worldwide. Similar to crabs, their front legs are larger than their back legs and they extend those legs out from their bodies. They also move sideways and backwards easily.

Like other spiders, crab spiders prey on other animals. But they don't set a trap for their prey with a sticky and strong spider web. Instead, many species sit, front legs outstretched, on a leaf or flower. Then they wait. When an insect, such as a bee, wasp, moth, or fly visits the flower for a sip of nectar or a nibble of pollen, the spider strikes. They grab their prey with their front legs, then inject venom to paralyze their prey and eat it.

Crab spiders vary in appearance. Some are brighter colors, such as white, yellow, and orange. Others are duller colors like browns and grays. Some species of crab spiders can even change color to aid in camouflage.
