

Fallen Leaves

Fallen leaves coat the ground. These leaves, which once were a symbol of life for the many plants in the forest, are now lying dead on the forest floor. The leaves' lives and functions are complete. But is that really true? While leaves play an important role in the lives of the plants they grow on, they play an equally important role as a part of the forest floor.

One of the most important jobs of fallen leaves is returning nutrients back to the soil. Through spring and summer, as plants grow, they suck key nutrients from the dirt through their roots, which are then incorporated into the plants' bodies, leaves included. When these leaves die, and eventually fall off, they rest on the ground where they decompose. returning some of those nutrients back to the soil they came from, where the plants can utilize them again in the future.

Dead and decaying leaves are also a crucial food source for many organisms that live on the forest floor. Many critters feast on these fallen leaves, including millipedes, snails, and pill bugs. Fungi and bacteria also eat up the leaves and help return those nutrients to the ground.

The dead leaves provide valuable shelter for many small creatures. Salamanders, toads, and insects all use the leaf litter for cover or camouflage. Some caterpillars stay in the leaf litter all winter long as they wait for spring to pupate and become adults.

These important roles aren't exclusive to the forest either. Leaves are beneficial in all habitats and spaces, even in yards and lawns. While they may seem unsightly, they are a valuable part of the ecosystem, and their presence helps a multitude of organisms live, grow, and thrive.
